At the first Board meeting on Oct. 12, Henry Shimizu was unanimously elected president. He had served as president several yrs ago and brings wide community service backgrd. N.S. awards \$270,000 to Marshall

HALIFAX — Donald Marshall Jr., who spent 11 years in prison for a murder he did not commit, has settled for \$270,000 in compensation from the province of Nova Scotia for his wrongful imprisonment.

In return, Mr. Marshall has agreed to waive any further legal action against the Crown for his ordeal.

The *ex gratia* payment, confirmed yesterday by Mr. Marshall's lawyer, Felix Cacchione of Halifax, will be made this week and will bring to an end Mr. Marshall's 2½-year struggle to clear his name.

To be sure, there have been innocent people executed, or imprisoned for decades. Occasionally, however, one hears of a happy story like Donald Marshall's, proclaimed innocent, and released after 11 years in prison.

Not only that, even when there was no legal requirement for the province to compensate for the grievous miscarriage of justice, Nova Scotia acknowledged her error, apologized, and gave a direct grant of \$270,000 compensation. Mind you, all of these do not erase those 11 years of being labeled a murderer, of confinement in prison for over a decade of his youthful years. But it does help! And Nova Scotia now has a good chance of holding her head up.

Some questions emerge.

1. Should Marshall have refused the compensation, because it would "cheapen" his suffering?
2. Should Nova Scotia have established a Trust Fund for a Half-way House for released prisoners, or set up a legal defence fund against injustice, instead of direct compensation?

Japanese Canadians to get public apology

OTTAWA (CP) — Japanese Canadians will receive a public apology from the Government and possibly compensation for their internment during the Second World War, Multiculturalism Minister Jack Murta said yesterday.

Moments after being sworn into office, Mr. Murta reminded reporters that his party is on record as favoring a public apology to the 22,000 people of Japanese descent who lost their property and were sent to internment camps during the war.

Mr. Murta, who served as opposition critic for multiculturalism while the Liberals held power, said he is considering establishing a committee of two or three people "to take a look and find out what we're talking about in terms of compensation.

"I think that would be a fair and objective way and, in my discussions with the Japanese community, they have already indicated they would like to see that," said Mr. Murta, one of four Manitobans appointed to Prime Minister Brian Mulroney's Cabinet.

When the issue was last discussed in Parliament, former prime minister Pierre Trudeau opposed compensating the Japanese Canadians for the seizure and loss of their property.

The Japanese-Canadian commu-

nity is divided on the issue. Some are opposed to compensation, fearing old wounds could be reopened, others favor individual compensation to those involved, while still others want to see a form of collective compensation involving senior citizens' homes and educational projects.

Mr. Murta also indicated he wants to ensure members of ethnic minorities receive more Government jobs.

"We want to make sure that in hiring practices . . . that all groups and people are represented in the country. That will certainly be a priority.

"I would also like to, as soon as possible, be looking at a federal-provincial conference on multiculturalism to talk to my counterparts across the country. That hasn't been done up to this point. I think that would be a good starting spot."

The Liberal government had talked of holding such a federal-provincial conference but the project never got off the ground.

A gracious way for the Mulroney Government to launch the new Parliament would be with an apology and a promise of compensation for Japanese Canadians who, during the Second World War, were forcibly removed from their Pacific Coast homes, interned and, in many cases, stripped of their property, merely because their ancestors had been Japanese.

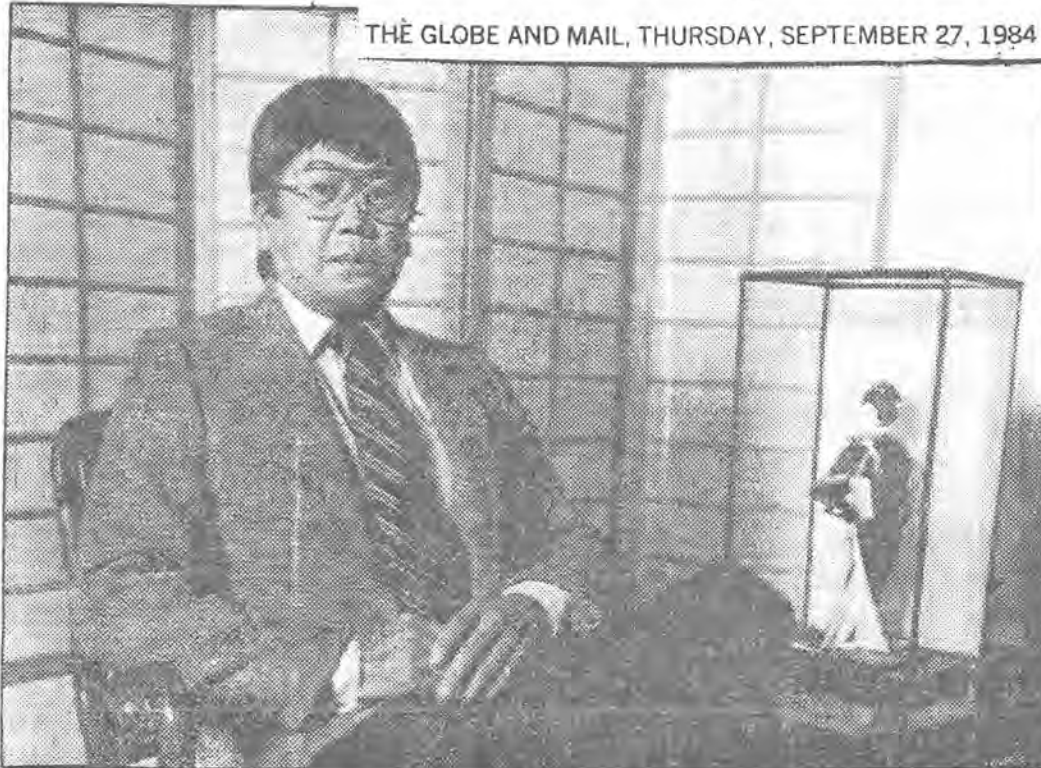
Pierre Trudeau contemptuously refused Conservative Leader Brian Mulroney's request, on the former prime minister's last day in the

Commons, that Mr. Trudeau use "this special day" to offer a formal Government apology. But an all-party Commons task force has recommended compensation; Prime Minister John Turner has favored an attempt to "redress" the injustice; Mr. Mulroney has said, "I feel very strongly that Canadian citizens whose rights were abused and violated and trampled upon indeed should be compensated."

May the new Parliament immediately put this long contempt behind us.

Former wartime internee works to prevent further injustices

WINNIPEG (CP) — Survival has become the key word in the life of Art Miki, a former wartime internee and the current president of the National Association of Japanese Canadians.

Mr. Miki was just 4 years old when the lower part of his face was ripped open in an accident at the British Columbia logging camp where his father worked.

Still carrying the jaw-line scar, the man who now heads the 45,000-member association remembers the days he spent in hospital when his parents, did not know whether he would live or die.

"I survived that," shrugged the affable, easy-going school principal, "so . . ."

Mr. Miki, now 48 and principal at an east-end Winnipeg

elementary school, faced the test of survival again when he found himself among the 22,000 Japanese Canadians from British Columbia who were interned during the Second World War.

The association is currently seeking an official apology and compensation from the Canadian Government for the internment, carried out because

the government of the time felt the Japanese Canadians posed a security threat.

In Mr. Miki's case, he and his Canadian-born family were forced to leave their six-hectare fruit farm. It was sold for \$2,000 and the land is now a housing subdivision on the outskirts of Vancouver.

The family was placed in a one-room, poorly heated house shared with other families near Ste. Agathe, Man.

Mr. Miki went to a French school, even though he did not know the language, while his father, mother and grandpar-

ents worked the sugar beet fields with about other 1,000 Japanese Canadians relocated in Manitoba.

The struggle to obtain an apology from the Government made little headway under the Liberal government of Pierre Trudeau, but things have looked brighter for the association since the Progressive Conservatives came to power last week.

On the day he was sworn into office, Multiculturalism Minister Jack Murta promised a public apology and said there was a possibility that those who lost their property between 1942 and 1949 could receive compensation.

"The financial part personally isn't of interest to me," Mr. Miki said. "I don't need the money."

Mr. Miki sees financial compensation as only one part of righting the wrongs of 40 years ago.

"There is the preventative factor," he said. "What can we do to make governments responsible for their action so they don't take it upon themselves to do this again to some other group?"

Mr. Miki said he believes the issue will be resolved one way or another in about a year.

"I think that as long as people become aware of what happened, that's an important part of learning and of history."

Mr. Miki, who cannot speak Japanese, will be getting a look at some of his own history soon.

Never having been to Japan, he recently won two tickets to the country his grandparents left at the turn of the century.

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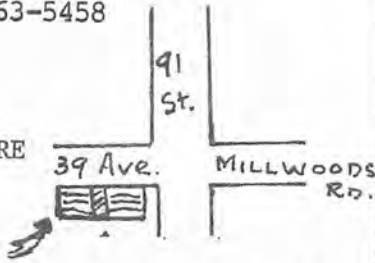
